The Adult Education Committee has arranged a Parish Mission again this Advent, so mark your calendars. "BEING CATHOLIC: A GRACE AND A PRIVILEGE" will begin on Sat. Dec.3rd and end on Sun. Dec.11th.

Father Oscar Lukefahr, who was the speaker at our Fall Potluck Dinner last year is back for a whole week by popular demand!

The noted Catholic priest, theologian, author, and Catholic apologist has over 40 years experience as a religious educator and is one of the most sought after and popular interpreters of the Catholic faith. Father Lukefahr is the author of numerous books, and operates the Catholic Home Study Service from the Archdiocese of St. Louis.

Father Lukefahr will open the Mission on Sat. Dec. 3rd by celebrating the 5:30 mass.

Wed. Dec. 7: "Four Levels of Happiness; Following Jesus"

Thurs. Dec. 8: Since this is a Holy Day of Obligation, celebrating the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, there will be masses at 6:30 and 8:00 in the morning and again at 7:00 in the evening. The topic for the Thursday homily is "The Real Presence of Christ". There will be a free will collection taken up after mass for Father Lukefahr. There will also be a 2nd collection on the weekend of Dec. 10/11.

# CURSILLOS IN CHRISTIANITY

Men's Weekend: March 1-4, 2012

Women's Weekend: March 8-11, 2012

Cursillo (pronounced *kur-see-yo*) is the Spanish word meaning "short course"; so a Cursillo Weekend (Thursday night through Sunday night) is a short course in Christianity. It is an encounter with self, Christ and others. During these weekends, those attending share the Eucharist and pray together. They live and have fun together, listening to and discussing talks given by priests and laity.

*"Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of us your faithful and kindle in us the fire of Your love. Send forth Your Spirit and we shall be created. And You shall renew the face of the earth."*

Does this prayer cause a yearning in your heart? A Cursillo weekend opens your heart and helps you to hear Jesus' call to discipleship more clearly.

In Matthew 5:13-16, Jesus tells us:

"You are the salt of the earth. But if salt loses its taste, with what can it be seasoned? It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket; it is set on a lampstand, where it gives light to all in the house. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father."

Pope Paul VI's Apostolic Exhortation on Evangelization in the Modern World #21:

"Above all the Gospel must be proclaimed by witness. Take a Christian or a handful of Christians who, in the midst of their own community, show their capacity for understanding and acceptance, their sharing of life and destiny with other people, their solidarity with the efforts of all for whatever is noble and good. Let us suppose that, in addition, they radiate in an altogether simple and unaffected way their faith in values that go beyond current values, and their hope in something that is not seen and that one would not dare to imagine. Through this wordless witness these Christians stir up irresistible questions in the hearts of those who see

how they live: Why are they like this? Why do they live in this way? What or who is it that inspires them? Why are they in our midst? Such a witness is already a silent proclamation of the Good News and a very powerful and effective one."

John Henry Newman wrote: "God has created me to do Him some definite service. He has committed some work to me which He has not committed to another..."

I experienced my Cursillo weekend in February 2011. I say experienced because it is so much more than just attending. We each have a "Best we can be", and each of us has their own environment where their daily lives take them. So each person will have their own experience of spiritual discovery, excitement and wonder.

In the Belleville Diocese, we host Cursillo Weekends at the DuBois Center near DuBois, Illinois. The next men's weekend begins the evening of March 1 and ends March 4, 2012 and the next women's begins the evening of March 8 and ends March 11, 2012. Below are some thoughts from some of your fellow parishioners about their Cursillos. Please talk with any of us if you are interested in a weekend or to hear more.

"I experienced my Cursillo weekend over 14 years ago in Dickinson, ND. I attended because my parents and family were very involved in Cursillo, and I was curious to see what it was all about. For me it was a very moving experience. I witnessed holiness in a joyful light with lots of love and laughter. I recommend everyone go on a Cursillo weekend."

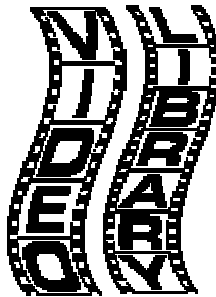
If you guess that the Holy Childhood School video library has movies that deliver a solid message of family values, faith in the marketplace, and following Christ, then you are correct.

However, if you also guess that the movies all have similar story lines and fall into the same genre, then you couldn't be more wrong. To demonstrate the nice variety, and to help you get started with a movie that you will enjoy, here are three movie comparisons.

If you liked *True Grit*, then try *The Inn of The SIXTH Happiness*. Both movies are a journey of struggle to overcome adversity; however, Gladys Aylward (Ingrid Bergman) demonstrates more grit than "Rooster" Cogburn, in her determination to live the life of a missionary in China. The wild west Oklahoma footage in *True Grit* is no match for the beautiful sweeping landscapes of rural China. Plus, much is revealed about Chinese culture in this true story of faith, courage, and fortitude.

If you liked *Bella* and *A Christmas Carol*, then try *Sarah's Choice*. *Bella*, a strong pro-life movie, is geared mostly toward a powerful decision based upon emotion and love. *Sarah's Choice*, also a strong pro-life movie, challenges the viewers to rationally defend the pro-life position against the wisdom of society. While Sarah receives unhelpful advice from a coworker, a boss, and a woman's clinic employee, she is aided by three *A Christmas Carol*-style visions that give her true wisdom to see through society's lies.

If you would like a combination of *Leave it to Beaver* and the Indiana Jones movies, then try *Escape from Wildcat Canyon*. As the story begins, this suburban America family is crumbling under familiar 21<sup>st</sup> century pressures. Then, young Pete Flint and his grandfather are faced with an Indiana Jones-like string of challenges, each one more difficult than the previous. In the end, the Flints, like the Cleavers, come together and the entire family learns a lesson about what is truly most important.

## St. Vincent de Paul Annual Report

At the end of September, our St. Vincent de Paul conference completed a mandatory yearly report of its activities here at Holy Childhood.

We found that we made 107 home visits last year and helped 148 adults and 136 children. Most of the requests for help were for utility bills that people could not pay. Since it was such a hot summer, we were very busy, making 36 visits during August and September alone.

While most of the calls for help concerned utility bills, we have seen an increase in requests for housing for people who are homeless. We helped 5 families who were living week to week at Mid America Inn just outside of Scott AFB.

St. Vincent de Paul works in concert with the Mascoutah Concerned Christian Ministry. Holy Childhood is part of this network and some of our members are on the board for Concerned Christians and help out with the food pantry run by Concerned Christians. We take turns with the financial part of helping people. We have to keep our funds separate from theirs according to the rules of St. Vincent de Paul.

Concerned Christians has the greater financial burden of helping people because they have a much broader base of support. They are 6 churches, we are one. The people of Holy Childhood are very generous in their support of St. Vincent de Paul. Last year you donated \$7,803 to us and we spent \$6,161 helping the needy.

The surplus money left over from donations is kept in a rainy day fund to help people if donations for one year fall short. ALL money donated goes to help people. We take nothing for travel expenses and don't go to fancy conventions on somebody else's dime.

We recently had some training with the regional St. Vincent de Paul Society. Part of the training dealt with making of home visits to the people we help. They were amazed that we visited with every family we helped. They said no other St. Vincent de Paul chapter in their region did this.

When we visit with people we do what we can to offer advice on how they may be able to help themselves. We do this in the most gentle, non-threatening way possible. No one knows better than we do that we are not trained counselors.

Two visits this past year stand out in my mind. Both of them concern homeless people. Our charter only allows us to help people one time every 12 months, and we are pretty much limited to \$200 per request for help. We had an 18 year old boy come to us for help. He had been living on his own since he was 15 and had been sleeping

under a bridge over the Metro-link tracks at night and riding the train during the day. He wouldn't say how or what he ate.

He had applied for a job at a local fast-food restaurant at Green Mount Crossing and was sure he had the job. He needed a place where he could stay and clean up for work. We put him up for a week at Mid-America Inn, which was about all that we could do. He said that was close enough to walk to work if he could not find a ride. After that week, he was gone and we never found out what happened or where he went.

I don't feel that we helped that young man all that much. We were able to get him by for one week out of his life. But, just maybe, we had a bigger impact on his life than we will ever know.

The other case involved a young woman who was also staying at Mid-America Inn. She was divorced, had one child, and had no contact with her ex-husband because of physical abuse. She did not even want her ex to know where she was staying because of fear of him.

She had worked as a seamstress at a factory in Lebanon that made items for the U.S. military. She lost her job when the factory decided to contract that part of the work out.

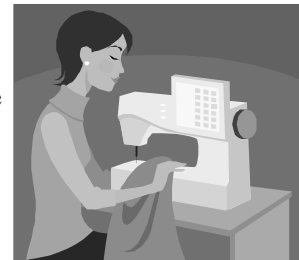
She bought the same sewing machines she had used and became that contractor. She had the sewing machines set up in her room; she and her son slept on the floor in the corner of the room. She was behind

in her rent because of an unavoidable car repair that she had to make in order to work.

She had been at the motel for several weeks and was very positive about getting a real home in the near future. She just needed some breathing room. I feel like we really did help her out and made a difference in her life.

The St. Vincent de Paul Society of Holy Childhood serves all people living in the Mascoutah School District without regard to race, religion, or ethnic background.

# **Congratulations, Monsignor Hartlein!**

This fall, our own Monsignor Jerry Hartlein has been chosen to receive not just one but TWO area appreciation awards for his service to the community.

On Oct. 1, the Belleville Diocese Chapter of the Knights of Columbus held the 27th annual Southern Friendship Dinner at Holy Childhood School cafeteria.

The Belleville Diocese Chapter, which was formed in 1978 is comprised of 52 Knights of Columbus councils. The Chapter recognizes outstanding Knights who demonstrate their commitment to Council, Community and Church activities and honors them at the annual Friendship Dinner in the fall. We are proud to announce that this year Msgr. Jerome Hartlein was one of the recipients.

On November 16, Father was again recognized by Althoff High School with the receipt of the VALUES & VISIONS AWARD at the 47th annual banquet.

In this parish, we all acknowledge the dedication, service and pastoral care he has showered on us for nearly 40 years, but Father Hartlein's care for his neighbor has spread much farther than that.

What makes Msgr. Hartlein so special that he received these awards you ask?

Let me tell you just a FEW of the reasons:

Msgr. Hartlein's first assignment was to St. Albert the Great Parish in Fairview Heights, with Msgr. Clement Schindler as pastor. He served there from 1958 to 1963, and joined the Knights of Columbus during this time. He received first, second, and third degrees on Nov. 1, 1959, and the fourth degree on 1 April, 1978. On July 1, 1973 Msgr. Hartlein was appointed as chaplain of the Holy Childhood of Jesus council #4380 of the Knights of Columbus. He continues to serve in this capacity after 38 years.

In 1963, Father Jerry was assigned as a full-time teacher at Cathedral High School, an all-boys Catholic high school serving parishes in and around Belleville. At that time he was also in residence at St. Mary's parish in Belleville and served as a part-time assistant to Msgr. Joseph Orlet. At the end of that school year, he was assigned as full-time assistant at St.

Mary's. When Cathedral High was closed in 1964, Father Jerry's teaching responsibilities were reassigned to the Academy of Notre Dame, the all-girl Catholic high school serving the parishes in the Belleville area. He also taught at Assumption Catholic High School (for boys) in East St. Louis.

These years of teaching created a special place in his heart for young people and their spiritual formation. His commitment to the education of diocesan youth through Catholic High Schools remained when Althoff High School was built to replace the two older schools in Belleville. Through the years, he continues his support of Catholic Education through Althoff High School.

On Oct. 19, 1965 Father Hartlein was assigned to his first pastorate at St. Mary's Church at Mound City, Illinois. Mound City is in the southern tip of Illinois and sits on the Ohio River just north of Cairo. The whole area was and still is officially termed "poverty stricken". When he got there, he found the parish was physically run down and the people were very poor.

He became heavily involved in developing humanitarian projects in the community. He became chairman of Head Start, the kindergarten program for "at risk" young children to help them prepare for success in school.

On July 6, 1972 Bishop Zuroweste assigned him to Holy Childhood of Jesus in Mascoutah. Msgr. Hartlein believed that a parish family should pray together, work together, and have fun together. As we all know Msgr. makes an effort to learn the names of each person and gets to know each one of us on a first name basis.

Soon after his arrival in Mascoutah, Msgr. Hartlein became a central part of the Ministerial Alliance. This group of six of the nine churches in Mascoutah was formed to develop a greater rapport in the community by coordinating some of their activities. Msgr. was elected chairman of this group in his first year in Mascoutah. Through the auspices of the Alliance, Msgr. aided in the establishment of a Senior Citizens

Center, where seniors can get a hot meal and lots of fellowship on weekdays. The Meals-on-Wheels Program for homebound seniors is run from the Senior Citizens Center and manned by volunteers from the community churches.

He was instrumental in starting the non-denominational Outdoor Way of the Cross which takes place each Good Friday, and is attended by people of all ages and all faiths. Another major event established by the Alliance is the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Day Service which is hosted from church to church in successive years.

Msgr. Hartlein was recognized by the community in 1988 when he was awarded the Mascoutah Chamber of Commerce "Person of the Year" award.

One of Msgr Hartlein's most beloved organizations is the Red Cross Blood Program in Mascoutah. Because of his efforts, Mascoutah has gone from a single annual blood drive in 1974 to eight drives per year, collecting over 800 units of blood a year. It has become a community event with great support, and Mascoutah is recognized throughout the area as one of the largest blood donating centers for its size.

He has served on and chaired many boards involving blood drives for the Red cross in both Illinois and Missouri. In 1988 he was chosen for the American Red Cross State of Illinois Individual Award for Blood and Tissue Services.

On May 6, 2005, he received the Christian Service Award given by Catholic Social services to persons who exemplify Christ by reaching out to those in need within the Belleville Diocese. Recipients of this award personify God's love for their neighbors and for all of us. Msgr. Hartlein leads by example, challenging his flock to grow in their love of God by giving and caring for others.

But the most important gift that Msgr. Hartlein has given to us has got to be his love of the priesthood. He has been a priest for 53 years and is the longest serving active pastor in the Diocese of Belleville.

Thank you Msgr. Hartlein for all you do and for just being you.
